BISHOP MCKNIGHT'S SEPTEMBER PRAYER INTENTION: For children deprived of a safe and healthy home, that they experience the love of God through the care and concern shown by Catholics.

UPDATED DECREE FROM BISHOP MCKNIGHT: Decree on pastoral activities during the COVID-19 pandemic and after 11 September 2020. August 20, 2020 | Health, Public Health Concerns

Whereas the Department of Health and Senior Services of the State of Missouri and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention of the United States federal government continue to recommend the observance of social distancing and the use of face masks when in gatherings; that persons 65 years of age and older, as well as those with certain medical conditions, avoid public gatherings as much as possible; and the practice of frequent handwashing or use of hand sanitizers; and

Whereas the common good demands that the public health requirements and recommendations of the state are to be observed whenever possible; and Whereas having received the recommendation of the Presbyteral Council to extend the current norms with regard to the pandemic; I therefore declare, as the diocesan bishop, the following:

1. All the faithful of the Diocese of Jefferson City, and those who are present in the territory of the diocese, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation until 27 November 2020, provided that for days of precept they do one of the following:
 1. Prayerfully participate in the Sunday or holy day of obligation Mass livestreamed from their parish church or chapel, the Cathedral, the Vatican, or of any Mass of the day celebrated in communion with the Roman Catholic Church.
 2. Prayerfully read and meditate on the readings of the Mass for the Sunday or holy days of obligation, and recite the Rosary or Divine Mercy Chaplet.
2. Parishes are highly encouraged to livestream Masses for Sundays and holy days of obligation indefinitely.
3. Those who are symptomatic for COVID-19 are not permitted to enter church properties, in accordance with national, state and local health directives. All are asked to check their temperature at home before going to church.
4. Those who are 65 years of age or older, and those with medical conditions, are highly encouraged not to go to Mass, especially when it is likely that there will be a large number of the faithful in attendance or if social distancing and the wearing of face masks are not observed.
5. Those who do not attend Mass on Sundays are encouraged to attend Mass on a weekday if it would be easier to observe the proper social distancing and other health recommendations.
6. The celebration of weddings outside of Mass may take place outdoors on the grounds of and in proximity to the parish church or chapels, according to the judgement of the pastor, parochial administrator, or parish life collaborator.
7. Pastors, parochial administrators, parish life collaborators, and the presidents and principals of Catholic schools are strictly obliged to follow the public health requirements, directives or orders of local government officials for gatherings of the faithful, including for the celebrations of Mass, weddings and funerals, other liturgies, devotions, school and catechetical activities, social events, sports activities, and meetings.
8. All other public health recommendations of state authorities should be followed whenever possible, especially with regard to singing in church, according to the judgment of the pastor, parochial administrator, parish life collaborator, president or principal. Consultation with the bishop, vicar general, moderator of the curia, local dean, liturgy commission chairman, or superintendent is recommended.
9. **The use of face masks upon entering the church, during the celebration of Mass except when in place in the pew, during the Communion procession, and upon leaving the church is required. If social distancing cannot be maintained in the pew, then the wearing of face masks is obligatory even in the pew.**
10. The offertory procession, the sign of peace, and Holy Communion from the chalice shall continue to be suspended. One or more stationary collection baskets are to be used rather than baskets passed or taken up by ushers. Where it has been the practice, the holding of hands during the Our Father must not be done.
11. Communion ministers are to sanitize their hands before and after distributing Holy Communion, and they must use face masks during the distribution of Holy Communion.
12. Those who persist in their desire to receive Holy Communion on the tongue may do so but only after those who receive Holy Communion in the hand, or in a Communion line designated solely for Holy Communion on the tongue. Communion ministers must purify and then sanitize their fingers after distributing Holy Communion on the tongue to each household.
13. High use areas within the church must be sanitized before each service, including the pews used by the assembly, restroom facilities, door handles, push plates, and knobs. It is advisable to have entrance and exit doors propped open during high traffic volumes before and after Mass.
14. Hymnals and other books are to remain stored for the duration of the pandemic. No materials may be left in the pews or adoration chapels. The faithful are encouraged to bring their own missals, hymnals and devotional books.
15. Holy water fonts shall remain empty.
16. Hand sanitizer should be made available throughout church and school facilities.

17. Other directives from the chancery for Catholic schools and religious education programs are to be followed. This decree is effective from 12 September 2020 and until 27 November 2020, anything to the contrary notwithstanding. Given at the Chancery of the Diocese of Jefferson City on this 21st day of August 2020.

PASTOR'S MEDITATION: 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time 2020 Year A: (Ezek. 18:25-28; Phil. 2:1-11; Mt. 21:28-32) IT IS OUR FINAL DECISION FOR OR AGAINST GOD WHICH WILL DECIDE OUR ETERNAL REWARD OR PUNISHMENT.

Today we remember to pray and observe the world day of Immigrants and refugees, our shared response to the many challenges of contemporary migration may be articulated by four verbs: **to welcome, to protect, to promote and to integrate** (pope Francis).

The word of God today warns us that it is our final decision for or against God, that is, our choosing to obey Him gracefully by doing His will or our choosing to go against His will, which will decide our eternal reward or punishment. As free beings, we are the ones who choose our eternal destiny

The Lord God, through His prophet, Ezekiel, corrects the Jewish beliefs that children inherit the guilt of their ancestors and are punished for their sins, and that God is more strict than merciful. God explains that His mercy overrules strict justice and that He will punish us only for our sins, not for the sins of our ancestors. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 25) appeals to God's compassion and mercy, begging Him to wipe away our sins and extend mercy to us. The second reading, Paul's Letter to the Philippians, also affirms the truth that the final choice for God, made by perfect obedience to Him, will be rewarded. Paul emphasizes the fact that it is because of Christ's obedience to God's will in emptying himself, taking human form and humbling himself by accepting even death on a cross that God the Father exalted Christ, bestowed on him the Name above every other name, and made Jesus the recipient of universal adoration. In today's Gospel, a man with two sons tells both to go out to work in the vineyard. The first son says he won't go, but later regrets it and works. The second son says he will go but does not. In each case, it is the final decision that is more important. Jesus teaches through this short parable that repentant tax-collectors and prostitutes, represented by the first son who initially refused to go, will make their way into the Kingdom of God before the chief priests and the elders, represented by the second son in the parable (not all those who say Lord, Lord will enter into heaven). By their pride and their refusal to obey God's call to repentance, the scribes and the Pharisees are excluding themselves, while the tax-collectors and sinners whom they despised are repenting of their sins and will be accepted into God's Kingdom. It is a parable on the necessity of offering a continual "yes" to the saving act of God.

Therefore friends we need to do God's will every day: Each one of us is responsible to God for every one of our actions, and the just God will punish or reward each individual according to that person's actions. Since we are not sure about the moment of our death, our only guarantee of dying in God's friendship is to live in that friendship always, saying "Yes," to God by doing His will.

It is never too late for us to repent, be converted, and allow the Holy Spirit to renew our life, if we have been disobedient to God in our past life; we need to knock at the door of God's mercy. God can, and will, do for us what, in his mercy, He, did for the repentant tax-collectors and harlots in the parable and in real life. Hence, every night we need to repent of our sins and ask God's pardon. If we are in serious sin we also have to be reconciled with God, the Church and our brothers and sisters through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, in order to be able to receive Jesus Holy Communion. Let us remember that it is never too late for us to turn back to God. **Have a blessed week! Fr. Leonard Mukibi**

St. Thomas the Apostle Parish Council Minutes - September 16, 2020

PPC Goal: Develop a more inclusive sense of community in our Parish by encouraging the growth of our relationships with each other and with God.

Members Present: Alan Reinkemeyer, Mark Luebbering, Debbie Strobe, Kathy Graessle, Sarah Luebbert, Jackie Prenger, Barb Graessle, Brian Luebbering, Theresa Veit, Ryan Wieberg, Curt Goeller, Father Leonard, Bob Schellman, Jan Carter. The meeting was opened at 7:30 p.m. with a prayer by Father Leonard.

Principal's Report (Leroy): There was no Principal's report.

Financial Committee Report: We have a healthy savings this year, better than most years. Giving is down approximately 3%.

Picnic Update: We had a very successful picnic.

Fall Fantasy Decision Item: The decision was made to pursue the idea of having a virtual silent auction event the last week of January, 2021. The event would possibly include a drawing with money prizes. The silent auction items may include themed baskets that are donated. The Social Concerns Committee is looking for volunteers who have technical skills to set up a virtual event. More discussion is needed to lay out the details of the event.

Worship/Christian Education: Confirmation is moving forward.

Social Concerns: The Social Concerns committee distributed a draft of a new welcoming booklet for newcomers to the Parish. They asked for feedback from the members of the PPC. They also have a draft of a protocol which will be used when new families are identified. They are also working on a protocol for the mentoring program that was included in our Parish Plan to the Bishop. Thanks to Debbie Strobe for her hard work in assembling the booklet.

Administration Report: The deck on the rectory has been completed. The steps up to the clock need to be repaired and bids are being obtained. The bid for the tuck-pointing of the school, which was being handled by the Diocese, has increased significantly. The committee will be working to try to figure out how to handle this increase. The committee is asking for volunteers to do snow removal. They need someone with a truck and a plow to spread salt. Brian talked about the need for repairs to various things in the church building i.e, lighting, the sound system, flooring, painting. We may need a construction manager to help organize all of the projects.

Pastor's Report (Father Leonard): Father Leonard thanked everyone for their hard work to maintain the grounds and the church. He also said our "Better Together" report was appreciated by the Bishop. Father talked a bit about the overall Church renovation. Father reported that we are now required to wear masks at Church if social distancing is not possible.

Parish Pastoral Plan Update: Brian gave an update to advise that Social Concerns was working on the first item in the Plan and the Worship Committee was working on the second item. There was a suggestion to do a presentation on FORMED during Mass at some point.
